From Our Pastor:

"He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed!"

But, what now?

Easter is a grand Sunday in the life of the church, the central celebration of our faith. We pull out all the stops-the choirs practices for weeks, we sing some of our most beloved songs, we read and hear of powerful texts of the empty tomb. But now it is over, and the question lingers "what now?"

I remember several years ago I attended a retreat focusing on spiritual renewal. It was powerful, I left on a spiritual high that high lasted me well into the following week. Eventually though, the luster wore off. The mundane day to day of living-going to work, paying the bills, doing the laundry-colored my attitude and tarnished my shine. It wasn't long before I felt a million miles away from the experience.

To many the month of April will be just "business as usual." Any confidence in the empty tomb, any hope in the risen Savior will be lost in the sea of worries and concerns of our day to day lives. That can happen to us too if we are not careful. If we allow it to happen, then we miss out on the most important reality of our faith. But if we pray for it to be real, if we pray for it to be transforming, Easter can be the beginning of a new awakening. We can go about our routine and still stay out of the rut because we know our lives have been forever redirected by heaven's power and Jesus' abiding presence.

Don't let April and the return to business as usual steal away the assurance, encouragement, and hope of Easter Sunday; not this month or any other. The empty tomb is our launching pad for hope, transformation, and victory. So even though this month, and even though it looks a lot like last month, remember that the Lord isn't dead! He lives for you! His victory is yours!





What's New In the Mustard Seed Library

Many of you may remember Pastor Neal Boese. He was a member of Emmanuel when Paz Erlandson was with us.

He has written several books which are in our Mustard Seed Library. His latest, published this year is Sharing Christ's Love: A Manual for the 21st Century Congregation, call #254. Pastor Boese wrote this personal note of encouragement to us at Emmanuel: Sharing Christ's Love is a manual that was developed when I was in Michigan in the mid 1980's as the Director of Evangelism for the Michigan Synod. Being a member of Emmanuel meant so much to me and you helped me understand a basic point of this manual. Regardless of congregational size, we all have a mission. We are called to share Christ's love to as many people as possible. So many feel alone, lost and without purpose and the Church has so much to say to them. Each one is loved by Jesus and through the congregation we can make that known. The manual presents many programs and suggestions that can be used in the

congregation and hopefully some of what is presented can make a difference."

Pastor Boese also wrote Spiritual Gifts: The Power That Drives You and the Congregation. He explains the scriptural basis for spiritual gifts. Christ's love flows through us when we are discerning our spiritual gifts and using them wisely. One of Pastor Boese's books--also in the Mustard Seed Library--is Blueprint for Change: A Manual for the 21st Century Congregation. On page 130, he writes "For years, volunteers have come forward to serve in necessary positions. They have come because they were committed to the congregation. Or, they have come because they were willing to say yes when asked to volunteer. Or, they volunteered because they felt guilty if the position wasn't filled. In the process, many volunteers have burned out. Burn-out is nothing more than anger turned inward. Members become angry if they are serving in a position and not functioning very well. They burn-out because they are not serving in their gifted area. The assumption that anyone in the congregation can serve in any capacity, especially leadership, is simply not true. Burn-out has caused many to not only leave the congregation but to leave the Church. It also has caused severe conflict in the congregation. Conflict can occur without much logic being involved. It happens as anger erupts in individuals and then spills over into the congregation." On page 12 of the Spiritual Gifts book, Pastor Boese writes, "As one baptized, God chooses me to be a part of His saving plan. It is not

because I volunteered or am so multitalented. I do not necessarily yet know why I am chosen, but it has occurred and it is my calling to fulfill that responsibility whatever it may prove to be. He calls me into the Church and, along with the gifts entrusted to others, my gift is used to bring others into God's saving plan."

We are indeed blessed to know Pastor Boese and have these books in our Mustard Seed Library. In the Spiritual Gifts book there is an inventory in the back which is helpful in reflecting upon and discerning one's own spiritual gift and several copies of that book are on the shelf.

There are many other books, DVD's and the "Lutheran Magazine" also in the Mustard Seed Library. Happy reading!!!!

2013 SOUTHFIELD/LATHRUP CROP HUNGER WALK

We ELCA Lutherans are one of 36 denominations that support Church World Service. CWS is a U.S.-based ecumenical organization. They sponsor our all-volunteer, locally-led CROP Hunger Walks.

We walk with a spirit of helping people who are living with hunger and poverty, to try to give them a hand up. We raise funds to partner with 3 local agencies: Southfield Emergency Food Program, Forgotten Harvest and Meals on Wheels--all committed to providing food to our community's most vulnerable and needy, food-insecure children, women and men.

Also, through CWS, we are able to partner with local agencies all over the world, regardless of whether they share our faith tradition, to help those who are suffering the most extreme hunger and poverty. CWS works in places where there is no Lutheran presence, such as Pakistan and Afghanistan and also in places where it has U.S. government permission to work, such as North Korea and Cuba.

Through our walking together this year with people from First Baptist of Detroit, St. David's Episcopal, Community Congregational, Covenant Presbyterian, Peace Lutheran, and Times of Refreshing

International Church, we show the face of Jesus in Southfield and in the world.

Noisy Offering

During the children's sermon each Sunday during Lent, Pastor Jackie had the child collect loose change from the congregation.

On Palm Sunday, it was announced that \$120 had been collected, which was enough to buy:

1) 20 chicks and 2 goats

or

2) one goat, two pigs, and 10 chicks

or

3) three pigs and 30 chicks.

These items would be purchased through the ELCA Good Gifts catalog to help needy people in the world to help themselves. Our congregation decided to get the second choice (one goat, two pigs and 1 dozen chicks).



\$50 Each

Goats can survive hot temperatures, rocky terrain or drought you name it! This makes them especially valuable for families

living in hot, dry climates where it's tough to raise other animals. Fresh milk, which is great for children, can also be used to make cheese, yogurt and other dairy products to eat and sell. As goats multiply, families often share the offspring with neighbors in need, helping lift entire communities out of hunger and poverty.



\$30 each

A pig in the pen is like money in the bank. Within months, a tiny piglet grows to weigh over 200 pounds! Should a family have a failed harvest.

medical expense or other unexpected financial need, this pig can be cashed in for big bucks at the market.

\$10 for 10 chicks



Ten little chicks make a big difference! When they are just months old, these chicks begin laying eggs, which make nutritious meals

for families who are hungry. The many extra eggs are often enough to allow a family to start a small business by selling them for additional income.

ELCA World Hunger responds to the root causes of hunger with work in 60 countries around the world, including the United States. Cornerstones of this work include hunger education, advocacy and projects focused on agriculture, livestock, water, health care and job training to help people lift themselves out of hunger and poverty for the long-term.

Other animals that could be purchased through the ELCA Good Gifts include: An Alpaca for \$175, a cow for \$500, a duck for

\$20, a sheep for \$125, a community fish farm for \$250.


