## **From Our Pastor:**

I have been blessed this month to be able to present to two people a couple of prayer shawls. What an interesting concept. This is a tangible item that is put together with one particular person in mind, and while it is being made, they are prayed for.

This month has been a month full of prayer. Some of our lessons in Luke speak to the power of prayer, and that as Christians we need to be in a constant state of prayer. I wonder how many of us actually attempt to achieve this. I do know that God hears our conversation and returns conversation in kind. But I don't think that most of us understand how to converse with God. We tend to not want to relate our earthly conversation with that of the "heavenlies." it's easier to make small talk to the strangers we meet.

I find that most of the strangers I meet on the street, know how to make small talk, like when we are in line at the grocery store, or waiting for a hair cut. We learn to make comments about the weather, sports, or even the latest celebrity gossip. Often if the weather is bad, people have their ready made lines like: "Nice weather for ducks." or "It's a little too chilly for my taste." Usually this kind of small talk happens when we are doing something that makes us encounter others for a short period of time.

Quite frequently when we are around others for an extended time, like the lines at the license bureau or the doctor's office, we become occupied with a magazine, thumbing through it, skimming some of the articles of interest, and frequently striking up a conversation with a nearby friendly face. But we don't usually just start in talking to others, because we don't want them to think we are crazy or weird. There is a comfortable manner in which to engage others in conversation, and an uncomfortable manner.

And if we are "normal" people which I think we are, we are also uncomfortable with our conversation with God. So what's wrong with starting with the small stuff. We can thank God for the rain that nourishes the land. We can thank God for the birds that make sweet music to our ears. And we can talk to God about our concerns. We can tell God about anything! Remember God is our best friend, and best friends don't come along every day, unless, our best friend is God.

### New Business



### Christian Education

### Worship and Music

## Emmanuel Community Farm News

The Emmanuel Community Farm's vegetable beds have been covered with compost and are being laid to rest for the winter.

This has been an exciting year for community gardening in Southfield. Father Chris Yaw of St. David's Episcopal Church on Twelve Mile Road, saw the Emmanuel Community Farm during the spring 2009 CROP Hunger Walk and asked Jon Adams, our director, to help their congregation use a piece of their land to grow food for the needy. Mayor Brenda Lawrence asked Jon to develop a small community garden over at the Mary Thompson Farm on Evergreen, to grow food for the needy. All of this brings to mind the interdependencies of small rural farmers, the sharing of expertise, experiences and ideas. Healthy rural communities are sustained when people realize that, to achieve their goals, they go farther working together than working alone. Because the Mayor's garden is small, they were able to plant tomatoes in 16" deep compost which produced a huge bumper crop harvest. Jon was astonished and has worked hard at obtaining much more compost for the Emmanuel Community Farm. Volunteers have worked diligently at cleaning up each row and then covering it with rich, dark compost, full of nutrients for next year's crop of vegetables, herbs and fruits. It looks great out there!!!!

We need to be thankful to Jon for all he has done for these community gardens/farm. Sometimes people have great ideas and, after a while, they peter out on sustaining the projects. Particularly with gardens, if they get messy or appear unkempt or have people with rowdy behavior tending them, poor relations with neighbors or local politicians result. Potential sponsors don't get excited or involved. The consistent, disciplined care of all of these community projects, aimed at providing food for the needy, shows the larger community something of our grit and determination and faithfulness and bodes well for another good year in 2011.

Altogether, over 1,000 lbs. of food were produced this year and delivered to Forgotten Harvest to feed the needy.

## **WELCA Convention - Serving The Lord**

The WELCA (Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America) convention, held at Faith Lutheran Church in Livonia on October 23, was extraordinarily inspirational. Beside the business part of the convention--electing officers, approving the budget, etc., four enrichment workshops were offered: Serve Through Advocacy; Serve Through Racial Reconciliation; Serve - Careers Through Faith; and Serve Through Prayer.

Janet Kotajarvi participated in the Racial Reconciliation workshop and reported that "we only touched the tip of the iceberg in this very complex problem of breaking down the walls of discrimination and things that separate us as we live out God's Gospel. Our time was cut short on this session which left us with so much more to learn and discuss." As our region of Michigan and, in fact our whole country continues to seek healing and freedom from the oppression of racism that brings so much destruction and hurt, it is such a blessing to know that we stand with so many other people in our Synod, in cities, suburbs, and rural communities, intent on exploring all the ramifications of this injustice and strengthened by God to find solutions together. We simply must get to know each other more lovingly. Our morning worship was blessed by the music of the Immanuel Lutheran Church Praise Team.

Pastor Christine Thompson led the workshop on Serving Through Prayer. "P" is for we are prepared because each of us is a child of God and has received the gift of the Holy Spirit. "R" is for request. Jesus honored the requests of people and honored those people and, when others ask us to pray for them, we do the same. "A" is for advocate. We each have an Advocate who works as our defense attorney with God and we pray for each other when we can't pray for ourselves. "Y" is for yield when we triumphantly pray "Thy Will be done." And finally Pastor Thompson helped us to understand more fully that, when we are open to stand with, to stand over with

our hand on their shoulder, to pray with in agreement, it offers others the opportunity to serve. Isn't that a great way to look at intercessory prayer!!!

The workshop given by Nick Synko on Serve - Careers Through Faith brought home to us that God creates each of us with gifts and talents (and often the gift is actually some adversity in life that we have had to deal with and that the greater self-understanding, the greater knowledge of the world and the strength that God gives us is exactly what He wants us to use in helping and serving others. That's a reason so many aptitude tests don't fully inform us, because they can't capture the full mystery of God's purposes for our lives and our work. Mr. Synko told us "We serve God, leaving a legacy and fulfilling our purpose by what we give," and also that "we sustain ourselves and serve others with income." Mr. Synko emphasized over and over that God is counting on us to use our gifts and talents in serving our neighbors and that fear is not to have any part in the equation. Marie Zeller participated in the workshop (she is the new president of our local WELCA) and she volunteered that one hypothesis about what is going on now in our economy, what our situation is now, is that we have such a heavy, heavy preponderance of people working "for the wrong reasons", not out of service, not out of wanting first and foremost to use the gifts and talents God has especially given us, but more for self-serving reasons and so our economy is tanking so that we will have to build from the ground up again. We might be like the Peace Garden outside of our church, pruned right down to the ground and which God will grow up again, green and pretty with flowers next spring. We need to prayerfully serve and be His hands in tending things so that His purposes are accomplished through us.

Women of the ELCA don't just talk about baking cookies and fashion and soap operas. We talk firstly about very serious things. We are hungry for more guidance as to how we can serve. Thank God that the WELCA Convention provided that. At the closing worship, Pastor Sparks anointed all of our hands, that all that we do, wherever we go, will be a

means to share the love of God and the gospel of Christ.

## Stained Glass Window Update



Recently two additional stained glass windows were restored and replaced completing work on the south wall of the sanctuary. The ongoing program to restore, what experts have acknowledged as fine

examples of stained glass artistry has been made possible through the generosity of individuals and family gifts to the Memorial Fund. As funds become available in the future, the remaining three windows on the north wall of the sanctuary will be completed.

## King David's Prayer of Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a special time to thank God for all He has given us.
