From Our Pastor:

Since I started writing about worship in our August/September newsletter, I thought I could continue with a review of "why we do what we do" in worship. It is easy to just get into the routing of "doing" worship without thinking about or realizing what we are trying to accomplish through it. So periodically I try personally to review the various elements of our worship to get in touch again the richness and beauty of worship.

We generally begin our worship service with either the "Confession and Forgiveness" or "Thanksgiving for Baptism." Both are pre-service rites, in other words they are not part of the liturgy proper. Prior to the reformation, the church required folks to attend confession with the priest in order to prepare themselves for worship and for communion. Martin Luther did not really change from this, he held to the teaching of private confession. He just felt it did not need to be done with a priest, but could be done in private, between the individual and God. During the mid-19th century however the church added public confession to the service before the formal liturgy began. This was done to enhance and encourage the private confession of sin, not to replace it. The purpose of starting with confession is more than just "cleaning the slate;" it is meant to prepare ourselves to receive the grace imparted by the "means of grace"-word and sacrament. Grace in our understanding is most properly understood and therefore properly received when we realize the depth of our sin and we acknowledge it before God and one another. That is not to say grace cannot be received in other ways, i.e. without formal confession, God can and does forgive based on God's criteria. But it is most effectively received through confession.

The "Thanksgiving for Baptism" reminds us that we were made one with Christ through baptism, that we were washed clean and brought into the community of believers through the water and word. This past year we used the "Thanksgiving for Baptism" during the Easter season. Easter is an appropriate time of year to celebrate baptisms and remember our own baptisms, as that is when the early church performed baptisms. It can be used at other times of the year too.

All worship is good in God's eyes, but there is a richness and beauty to the elements of Lutheran worship that I hope we can appreciate. Next month I will remind of the role music plays in all of this.

Samaritan Counseling Center Lay Caregiver Series presents:

Crying Out To God: The Place Of Lamentations In Lay Caregiving

Workshop on Sunday, October 20, 2013

Too often we shy away from talking about and naming the suffering in our lives and in our world. There are normal human losses to lament, deaths, disappointments, and hidden depression with which to contend. There are broken marriages, catastrophic illnesses and violence among our children, hatred between groups, and debilitating poverty all around us. Caregiving requires that we listen and give witness to these experiences in order to come to a place of hope.

Dr. Robert Martin, Executive Director of Samaritan Counseling Center, will use the *Book of Lamentations* as a means to explore these realities. Using *Lamentations* five poems, which express pain, fury and despair in an intense struggle for life, participants will be invited into a house of sorrow where voices of loss and pain are honored and heard and where one finds a safe place for tears and the beginning of healing.

The workshop will be held on Sunday, October 20, 2013 at Nardin Park UMC, 29887 W. Eleven Mile Rd., Farmington Hills, MI 48336 (on the south side of Eleven Mile just west of Middlebelt) from: 2:30 to 4:30 p.m.

What's New In The Mustard Seed Library

The Church is constantly grappling with being inclusive. Old-timers and new-timers may struggle with feeling on "different tiers of belonging". People who are comfortable financially and people who are on assistance may struggle with establishing a comfort level in being together, that absolves anyone of feelings of shame and guilt and/or failure. People who are of different sexual orientations may struggle with unnamed perceptions and stereotypes which lessen genuine feelings of community and being able to be "who a person is inside."

The Mustard Seed Library is constantly receiving new materials which we hope the congregation may find spiritually uplifting.

Regarding teaching and helping people to grow in their understanding of God and Jesus in their lives, we already had on the shelves Helping Youth and Adults Know Doctrine (1963), and How to Teach God's Story (1973). Our latest addition to the shelf is What Do You Seek? Welcoming the Adult Inquirer (2000 - August Fortress, Call #248)

Regarding human sexuality, we already had on the shelf <u>Unprotected Texts</u>: <u>The Bible's Surprising Contradictions About Sex and Desire</u> (2011) and <u>A Year of Biblical Womanhood</u> (2012). Our latest addition to the shelf is <u>Torn</u>, <u>Rescuing the Gospel from the God-vs.-Christians Debate</u>, by Justin Lee (2012 - Call #230).

For quite a while now, Emmanuel has been inviting people who use the food pantry, to request prayers. On Wednesday mornings, at our prayer time in the sanctuary, we lift up prayers to God for all the food pantry recipients and also now, specifically, for the concerns which they have communicated to us. In seeking to understand more deeply the needs of food pantry recipients, a book has been donated entitled Living Faith: Everyday Religion and Mothers in Poverty (2011 - Call #261.8) by Susan Crawford Sullivan, assistant professor of sociology and an Edward Bennett Williams Fellow at the College of the Holy Cross. She has also been a visiting assistant professor and research associate at Harvard Divinity School.

Emmanuel has a team of volunteers who participate in leading the worship at the

Fountains Assisted Living in Southfield. Pastor Jackie, Alfonso Hill, Pat Ochodnicky, Eddie People, Jerry Hall, Pat Hall and Sharon Hall have all helped and participated from time-to-time in presiding over the worship, distributing communion and also giving a message. Pastor Jackie, in her sermons, usually tells us outright, that she intends we hear the Gospel and it is towards the end of her sermons. A new book has been donated to the Mustard Seed Library, The Law-Gospel Debate, by Gerhard O. Forde (Fortress Press, 1969 -Call #230). He was Professor of Systematic Theology at Luther Seminary, St. Paul, and a chief articulator of "radical Lutheranism". I have asked Pastor to share a few of her thoughts here also as to why this book might be worthwhile to be in the Mustard Seed Library.

Pastor Jackie wrote -- "Law and gospel is the guiding principal for Lutheran and many other Protestant traditions' understanding of Scriptures. Luther says in the Apology to the Augsburg Confession "All Scripture ought to be distributed into these two principal topics, the Law and the promises. For in some places it presents the Law, and in others the promise concerning Christ, namely, either when (in the Old Testament) it promises that Christ will come, and offers, for His sake, the remission of sins, justification, and life eternal, or when, in the Gospel (in the New Testament), Christ Himself, since He has appeared, promises the remission of sins, justification, and life eternal." I haven't had a chance to read the book, but it sounds like an interesting read

on the development and debates surrounding this."

The Mustard Seed Library is one way in which the faith community at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Southfield can circulate books of common interest and help us to fulfill our Call to Mission, "We are called to proclaim Christ's Love and God's grace by inviting all into a spiritual relationship with God through worship, bible study, witness, service and fellowship." There is a very comfortable chair in the library and good lighting, please feel free to browse our collection of books and DVD's and check some out at any time.

Meet Our New Missionaries

As you know, Emmanuel has helped support Barbara Robertson, a missionary in Tanzania, for the past several years. Barbara visited us in 2011 when she was back in the States on sabbatical and took an active part in our VBS that summer. Barbara has now retired and at its September meeting, our Council voted to transfer our mission support to pastors Martin and Angela Zimmann who are serving in Jerusalem.

Pastors Martin and Angela are from our own Southeast Michigan Synod and began their new call in February. Biographical information can be found on the bulletin board in the narthex. In Jerusalem they are co-pastoring at The Lutheran Church of the Redeemer (the English speaking congregation --- the church also has German and Arabic speaking congregations). In addition they serve as special assistants to Bishop Munib Younan of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Jordan and the Holy Land, one of our companion synods.

The Zimmanns have two children, 14 year old Seth and 10 year old Chelsea. Though Pastor Martin has been to Palestine many times, Pastor Angela and the children had never been there. I know the family through my work with the Synod and attended their sending service in February. Then in March I just happened to be in Jerusalem with a group from our synod, and worshipped at Redeemer on the Sunday that they were installed. We had an opportunity later to visit with them at their home on the top of the Mount of Olives and were amazed at how well the family is adjusting to a very different culture.

The Zimmann family will be in the States for two months next summer and have promised to visit us here at Emmanuel to share their experiences. We can also follow their posts on Facebook (Zimmanns in the Holy Land). They're a dynamic family and they have taken on a challenging ministry in a sometimes volatile region of the world --- please remember to hold them in prayer.


